I think more states should follow Oregon's new ruling. Oregon lawmakers were disqualified and could not be added back to the Republican primary ballot because they had multiple absences when they did not want to vote on a bill that required a quorum to be present. They were barred from running for reelection by the secretary of state for having 10 or more unexcused absences from the Legislature.

# **US Legislation**

Senate Democrats recently reintroduced the John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act, breathing new life into the bill by introducing a new formula for determining which states are subject to preclearance.

## Ohio Legislation

Citizens not Politicians continues to gather signatures to end gerrymandering in Ohio. Right now in Ohio, politicians and lobbyists manipulate voting districts to protect their interests and guarantee their reelection. In other words, we let politicians choose their voters when the voters should be choosing their politicians.

If you have not signed a petition yet, I urge you to do so. They are collecting signatures on election day. If you have not voted yet, the primary election determines who you will be on the ballot in November. Several issues are on the ballot also.

Every eligible voter deserves to have their vote counted. That is the cornerstone of our democracy. And we all suffer when eligible, registered voters are turned away from the polls, unable to find their polling place, or otherwise blocked from exercising their rights. Fact: There are currently 129 active voting rights cases spread across 37 states and the District of Columbia. This does not include cases involving campaign finance, Former President Trump's indictments and potential disqualification or redistricting.
